Following on from another successful set of results, where the class of 2022 continued the trend of excellent results; I want to congratulate those students, as they worked exceptionally hard during a difficult two-year period. The progress score for this cohort ranks the school 4<sup>th</sup> out of the twenty-four 11-16 schools in Surrey.

I am just as proud of the current students. The atmosphere in lessons and work ethic of the vast majority of students has illustrated that the positive GCSE results will continue. We have been particularly impressed with how quickly the year 7 students have settled.

We understand that education is more than just GCSE grades and I have loved our Wednesday afternoon 'Thrive' sessions and would like to thank all staff for their commitment to running these sessions (46 different activities) and to our students who have really got involved and grabbed the opportunities given to them.

In addition to these sessions, it has been fantastic to see our students embrace all the other extra-curricular opportunities provided, including; Sport, Performing Arts, Latin, Maths, Science, Art and D of E.

The students were fantastic ambassadors for the school during Open Evening. They were a credit to the school, themselves and you. I'd like to give particular thanks to our two year 7 students, William Standing and Leanna Quinlan and Head Students, Ella Radley and Sam Marcus for the eloquently delivered speeches on the evening. The evening was very busy and I have received many positive e-mails, all of which refer to how fantastic the students were.

It seems like we have been talking about a 3G pitch on site for many years now and finally this work has started, with diggers in the ground and it is expected to be completed in March. This will be a fantastic facility for our students and the local community.

Finally, I would like to re-iterate my thanks to all parents and students for all you have done to support us. I wish you all a restful and safe half term and look forward to the return of all students at the beginning of next half term.

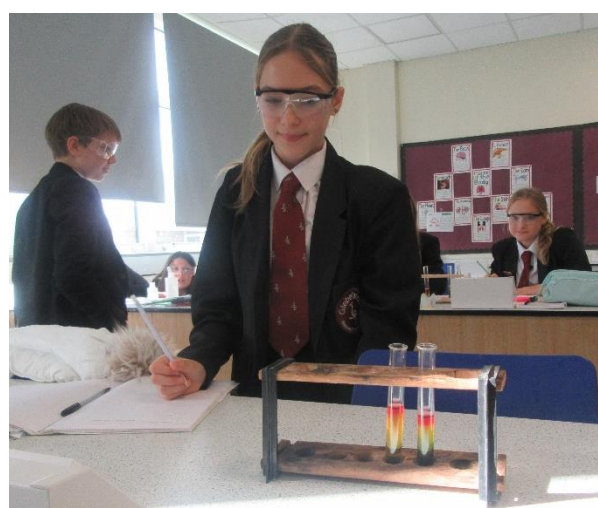
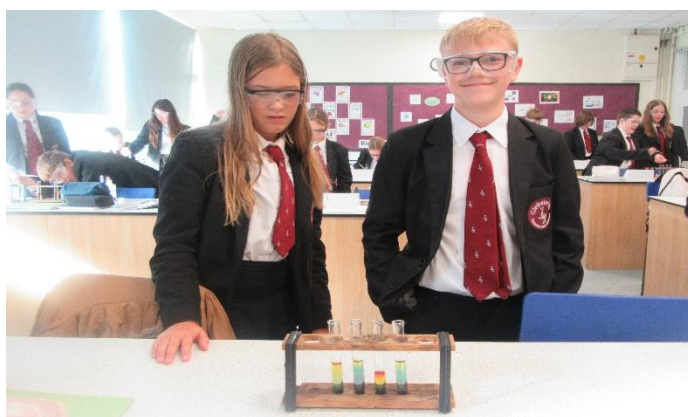
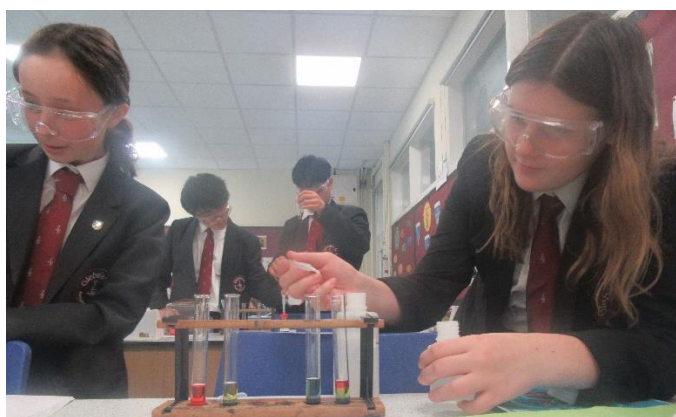

## Work Experience

Last week we held an important assembly for Year 10 students about next year's work experience. We are really delighted that this opportunity is back for our students to participate in after an absence due to Covid restrictions. We talked to the students about the importance of them organising a placement and considering what type of workplace would be best for them to approach for a placement. The general aim of work experience (WEX) is to give your son/daughter first-hand experience of the world of work and, in some cases, to try the kind of job he/she may want to consider in the future.

Students have to find their own placement, which can be done by phone/email or in person. We hold lists of previous placements, which can be consulted during break and lunch time in the LRC, if your son/daughter needs some inspiration. Students will also receive time during Learning for Life lessons to assist with this process under the guidance of Mrs Bradley. Please read carefully the information sent out by Mr Smitheram to you about how to complete the form and with regards to health and safety/ insurance matters. All forms must be returned to Mrs Bradley by Friday the 2<sup>nd</sup> of December at the latest. Please ensure this deadline is stuck to as there is a huge amount of administration to do once all the forms are back in. ## ATTENDANCE MATTERS

We are all aware that attendance is important. All research informs us of this: we know that students are more likely to succeed in academics when they attend school consistently. At Glebelands we do not underestimate the impact that parental support has on ensuring good attendance. It has been a tough year for all our families and Covid19 has taken control of many things including the future of our children. With your continued support we can all work together to gain back control and make their future years a success.



Students who are frequently absent will fall behind with learning, we do not want this to happen; absence can make students feel anxious and vulnerable; we do not want this for our students. All students at Glebelands are valued, important and anything that gets in the way of their education is important to us.

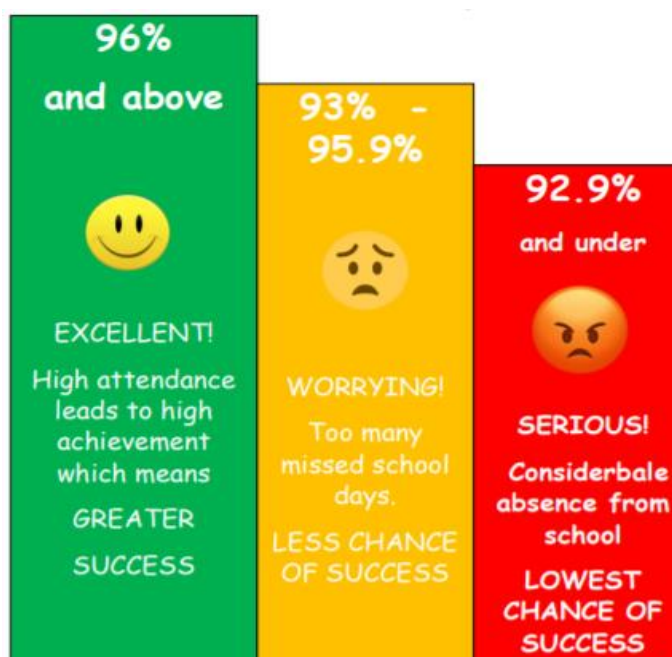
Missing a few days of school here and there may not seem a big deal, but research shows that it can have a significant impact on children's learning. Most of the work they miss is never made up, which can lead to big gaps in their learning.

Fact: Students who are absent between 10 and 20% of school (that's 19 to 38 days per year) stand only a 35% chance of achieving five or more good GCSEs, compared to 73% of those who miss fewer than 5% of school days.

### Build the Habit of Good Attendance

- Parents and schools have a key role to play in children's success
- One of the most important life habits we can instil in children is attendance
- Promoting good attendance helps children to understand the importance of education, commitment and taking responsibility

### What Parents/Carers can do

- Set a regular evening and morning routine
- Do not let your child stay at home unless they are truly sick (we do not operate a 48 hour policy)
- Develop back up plans for getting to school if something comes up. Call a family member, a neighbour or another parent and check bus timetables and routes
- Avoid medical appointments and holidays during term times

Wherever possible please notify the school in advance of any medical or dental appointments by emailing [absence@glebelands.surrey.sch.uk](mailto:absence@glebelands.surrey.sch.uk). Please remember to write a note in your child's journal to confirm the absence in order for the class teacher to release your child from their lesson.

All students must sign in and out of Student Services for health and safety purposes.

We would like to draw your attention to taking holiday on the last day of term, although the students are only in school until 12:35 they are registered before they leave and therefore receive an afternoon session mark, this means that the last day of term is considered a full day in terms of absence.

## Application for Leave of Absence for Exceptional Circumstances

*Please read the following guidance carefully.*

As parents, you have a legal responsibility to ensure your child's attendance at school. During the academic year, pupils are at school for 190 days and at home for 175 days.

**Please be aware that The Education (Pupil Registration) (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2013, which became law on 1 September 2013, state that Headteachers may not grant any leave of absence during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances. The Headteacher is also required to determine the number of school days a child can be away from school if leave is granted.**

If you want to take your child out of school you will need to complete and submit our Application for Leave of Absence for Exceptional Circumstances Form, which your child can get from their Head of Achievement. **Once the form is completed it should be returned to your child's Head of Achievement – one form per child.** The form will then be submitted to the Headteacher to consider your request for your child's leave of absence for exceptional circumstances. The Headteacher will consider the reasons for the request carefully and will notify you of the decision. For further information, please refer to our School Attendance Policy. We may ask for proof to back up your request.

## Unauthorised absence of 5 days or more may result in the issue of a Penalty Notice

Penalty Notices are issued by the Local Authority in accordance with Surrey County Council's Code of Conduct. The Penalty Notice is £60, per child per parent/carer, if paid within 21 days or £120 if paid after 21 days but within 28 days. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in you being served a summons to appear at the Magistrates Court.

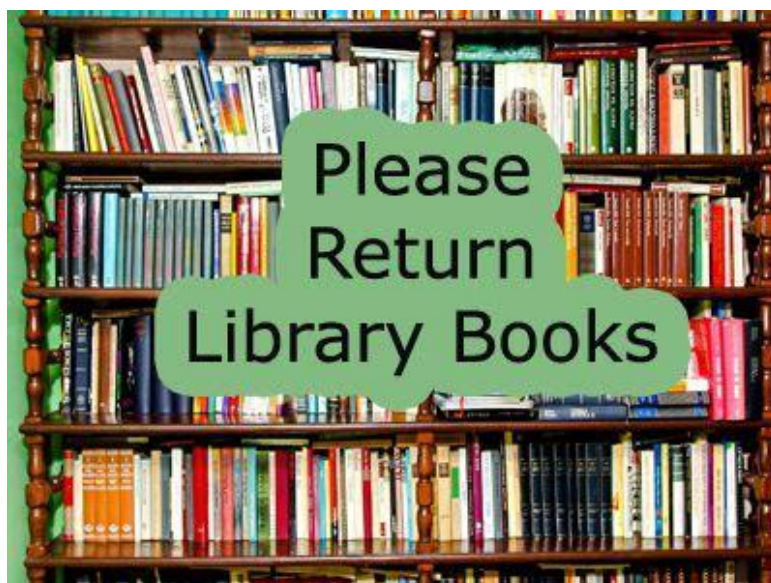

## FREE SCHOOL MEALS

Your child may be able to get free school meals if you are currently in receipt of any of the following:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999 the guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on - paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit - if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

If your child is eligible for free school meals, they'll remain eligible until they finish the phase of secondary schooling they're in on 31 March 2023.

If you feel that your child may be eligible to receive free school meals, please contact the school on 01483 542400 and request a Free School Meal application form.
