Year 11 School Trip: 'An Inspector Calls'

On Thursday 24th of November, a group of Year 11s attended the performance of 'An Inspector Calls' at the Yvonne Arnaud Theatre in Guildford. 'An Inspector Calls' is one of the set texts on the GCSE curriculum but is well worth a watch in its own right as one of the most popular 'whodunnit' plays in literature. First performed in 1945 and set in 1912, its themes of inequality, class, and gender remain as relevant to the 21st century as to the 20th century. Directed by Stephen Daldry, this National Theatre production has won numerous awards and it is easy to see why: everything from the set to the positioning of actors onstage was clearly thought out and planned, adding to the themes of social responsibility and elitism in the play. The Year 11s on the trip were fantastic and a credit to school. It was a superb evening and great preparation for their mock exam too!

ICELAND 25th-28th November

For the second time this year the Geography Department took 50 Year 11 Geographers for the fieldtrip of a lifetime to Iceland. After an early departure we arrived in Iceland and headed straight to the plate boundary between the North American and the Eurasian plate, which was perhaps the primary reason for our visit as it shows the pupils why Iceland exists – a fact that would be invaluable in their mocks. Pupils were able to stand on the boundary and see plate tectonics first-hand and the reason why Iceland appeared over millions of years out of the Mid Atlantic Ridge. From there we went for a swim in the Blue Lagoon under a starry sky which was only topped by our first view of the Northern Lights on the journey into Reykjavik.

After a comfortable night we drove along the main road to the most southern part of Iceland, Vik. The journey took us past, behind and up spectacular waterfalls and included a walk on the Solheimajokull glacier. Pupils were reminded of the fragility of the glacier and how it is likely to have disappeared in the next 80-100 years. A viewpoint stop to see Eyjafjallajökull in all its glory was great for real life case study to conclude the journey.

Saturday evening in Vik, pupils reflected on the learning of the day and conducted some revision in preparation for their mocks before the second viewing of the Northern Lights. It was spectacular, a great life experience for all of us (some of us have been going on the trip for 10 years and have never seen them!) - a life goal certainly ticked off my list.

Sunday had a trip to see sunrise on the black sands beach at Reynisfjara, with its basalt columns, stunning coastal features and thunderous ocean waves. It was then back on the coach to the Lava centre to learn about Iceland volcanic history and then we travelled the Golden Circle to see Thingvellir National Park, Gullfoss Waterfall, and Strokkur geyser. A third viewing of the Northern Lights and a meal at the famous Hamburger Factory ended with Cara Desmond having the opportunity to update Iceland's population clock.

Monday, 6am and Mr Bromley with four students started their day with a 5K run around Reykjavik! After breakfast the final leg of our trip took us into Reykjavik city centre to see its world-famous iconic church and take a walk down the main street which was lit up like Christmas. A simulated flight over Iceland concluded a fabulous trip with a group of truly awesome students and staff.

ICELAND

After that we took a short coach ride to the Blue Lagoon, which one of the most unique experiences of the trip, due to us visiting at night we got our first glimpse of the Northern lights, as well as this we all got a free drink and face mask. After the Blue lagoon we went to stay our first night in a Hotel Cabin. On day number two we started to the day with another coach ride to a waterfall. On the ride we did see our only bit of snow of the whole trip, the waterfall dropped 60m and we got to walk behind it, which was a very refreshing experience and it is fair to say we were all very wet by the time we got back on the coach.

The endless flights of stairs we climbed were all proven worth it as we were able to see countless amazing sites (waterfalls and even the end of a rainbow) throughout every stop we made during our trip. To end off our second day in Iceland, we all grabbed a pick axe and began to hike up one of Iceland's many glaciers. Whilst on the glacier, we were able to admire the beautiful views of the water below and even eat some of the ice. After the second night we woke up on our final day there and headed out to the black sand beach where we watched the sun rise over the enormous waves. After this early morning beach trip, we all went to a museum to walk through an interactive experience about the various interesting features of Iceland's unique landscape. We then ended the day with a trip to see the geysers which produce large plumes of water roughly every 8 minutes due to heating of water and building pressure below. Before sadly heading home, we took part in a virtual reality 'Fly Over Iceland' experience, emerging us in the unique scenery and landscapes around the surface of Iceland. The highlight of my visit (and I'm sure most others) to Iceland was the sighting of the northern lights which we not only witnessed once but did so every night that we were there (three nights in a row). The rarity of this experience is what made the northern lights, along with the rest of our phenomenal trip, so unforgettable to us all.





These students demonstrated fantastic analytical work, as well as clear efforts to revise their allocated key terms and definitions in music. This, considering they only have one 50-minute lesson of music per two weeks – wow! Next term, I will also be identifying students who have improved/gone up grades from one module to the next – all to work, play and sing for then!

We are currently devising a system to reward our students with colours in music, at bronze, silver and gold. Students will be able to apply for these colours for representing the school at internal and external performance events, as well as achieving high scores (grades 7 to 9) in tests, but also for demonstrating improved progress in curriculum music (increasing their subject grades). Exact criteria will be communicated with students next year. We will also be accepting applications for a music captain, and deputy music captain from our year 10 cohort in the summer term, to give our students a representative voice and enable these student leaders to develop and organise musical activities in and out of school.

Year 7s have been learning about different music from different continents around the world. They have become aware of and defined terms associated with duration and pitch, applying these elements through singing different songs as a whole class. It has been a real pleasure enthusing them to sing and move with music this term. Next term, they'll be learning about texture and sonority through incidental music. Year 8s have been learning about film and TV music. They have become aware of and defined terms associated with sonority and texture, applying these through short, group compositions using a variety of string, brass, woodwind and percussion instruments. I have enjoyed facilitating their creativity and expression in music this term. Next term, they'll be learning about structure and dynamics, through the topic of musical theatre.

Year 9s on the recent rotation have written their own songs and performed a selection of these in groups. They have also worked on their own compositions using BandLab, whilst learning about and presenting information about the music industry and associated careers. We feel that an awareness of the industry at this stage is important, as they begin to consider their options for key stage 4. I have enjoyed supporting them all through their composing and performing, but also helping them to see that they are all eligible to contribute to and enjoy the world of music in their leisure and professional careers.

Year 10s have amassed an impressive vocabulary of terms associated with musical elements, including duration, pitch, sonority, texture, dynamics, articulation and structure. They applied this vocabulary through learning about set works of music by Purcell, Bach and Beethoven. They have also had to perform solo and ensemble pieces to their peers, as well as writing their own arrangement of a Christmas song. Next term, they'll be learning about music by Queen, Afro Celt Sound System, Esperanza Spalding, John Williams and Stephen Schwartz, as well as preparing more pieces to perform in class concerts.

Our extra-curricular provision continues to evolve, grow and deliver. In December, our choir have successfully performed for local events including Acorn Nursery's nativity, at Lucy Bushnell's Santa Dash, and at our school carol concert, accompanied by our school orchestra. I have thoroughly enjoyed rehearsing and directing these students in and out of school.

I will be engaging with our students to develop a programme of music to perform internally, called, 'Evening of Note'. The planned date for this is Thursday 4th May 2023. It will involve our larger musical ensembles, but will also welcome solos and duets by our students. Preparations for this will begin after Christmas, so save the date!

I am also really excited about our musical theatre club. They've also really enjoyed coming along after school on a Friday to sing a variety of songs from musicals. Their energy is infectious and will feed well into our confirmed summer production of Legally Blonde Junior. All students in years 7, 8, 9 and 10 are welcome to



audition for a variety of singing and/or acting roles from the week commencing 16th January 2023, rehearsals starting week commencing Monday 20th February, and planned public performance dates of Thursday 13th and Friday 14th July.

ATTENDANCE MATTERS


We are all aware that attendance is important. All research informs us of this: we know that students are more likely to succeed in academics when they attend school consistently. At Glebelands we do not underestimate the impact that parental support has on ensuring good attendance. With your continued support we can all work to gain back control and make their future years a success.



Students who are frequently absent will fall behind with learning, we do not want this to happen; absence can make students feel anxious and vulnerable; we do not want this for our students. All students at Glebelands are valued, important and anything that gets in the way of their education is important to us.

Missing a few days of school here and there may not seem a big deal, but research shows that it can have a significant impact on children's learning. Most of the work they miss is never made up, which can lead to big gaps in their learning.

Fact: Students who are absent between 10 and 12% of school (that's 19 to 24 days per year) stand only between a 45% to 35% chance of achieving five or more good GCSEs, compared to 74% of those who miss fewer than 5% of school days.


