

MESSAGE FROM THE HEADTEACHER

As we come to the half-way point in the academic year, for me it is a time to reflect. I am really encouraged by the work going on in lessons and I feel the majority of students are working exceptionally hard. This term has seen the beginnings of the school house system which has been designed to create more opportunities for students and collaboration between year groups.

I was delighted to see the number of parents who attended our Subject Evening for Year 11. This was the first face to face parents subject evening we have had in three years and it was fantastic to have the community feel and buzz back in the hall.

Early next half term, the GCSE options process begins for our Year 9 students. Information Evening is on the 21st of February. I urge all parents to attend, as this is an evening where the process is explained fully and will help you in supporting your child to make good option choices for Years 10 and 11.

We are delighted with how many students are getting involved in our extra-curricular activities which are available to them including Art, Drama, DT, Science, Music, Maths, Latin, Duke of Edinburgh and sports.

This term sees the eagerly anticipated completion of our newest facility, our 3G Football Pitch – to be known as The Sanctuary. This will be a community facility and Glebelands School are proudly partnered with our local football clubs, Cranleigh Football Club and Ewhurst Junior Football Club to deliver this exciting development. It is state of the art, FA approved and generously funded through the Football Foundation, local grants from Waverley Borough Council through local housing developments, the school and Cranleigh Football Club. Students will be able to use this throughout the school week and in order to maintain the pitch to the required FA standards students will only be able to use the pitch with the required footwear as previously advised in September 2022. 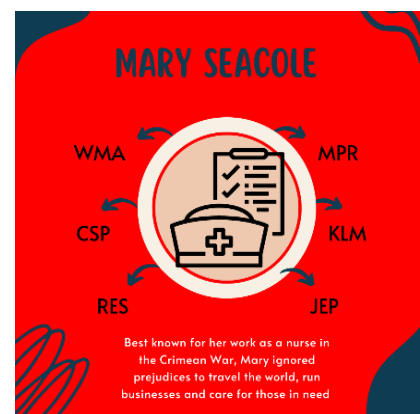
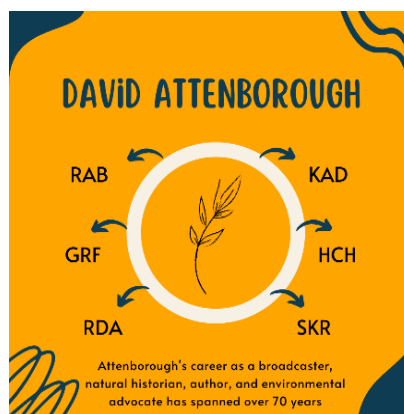
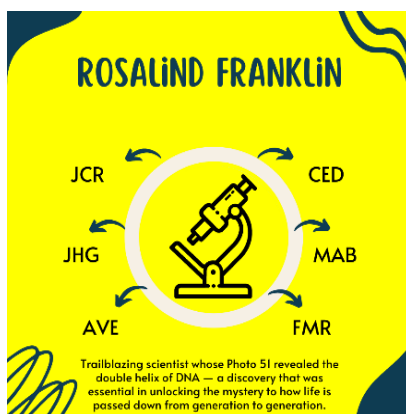
Here at Glebelands we have vision that encompasses three fundamental elements:

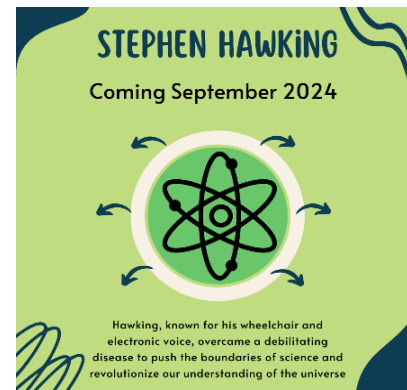
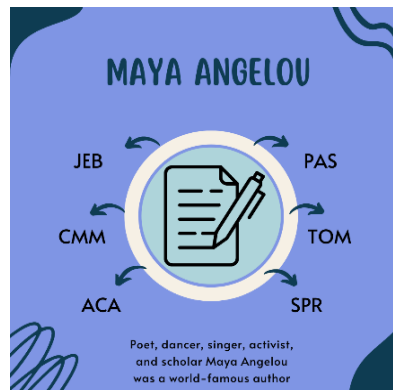
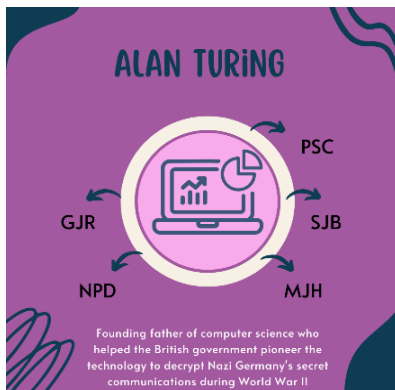
- Challenge aspirations

- Create opportunities to thrive

We believe that a House System will be a valuable addition to these fundamental elements as it will enable us to create opportunities for students to thrive, to open minds and to challenge aspirations out of the classroom as well as in it. Having a House System at Glebelands will further the notion that whilst our key focus is academic development, we also aim to help students become well rounded individuals with the social skills for later life, to understand what it means to collaborate, respect one another and achieve a group goal.

The House System at Glebelands aims to foster a sense of belonging and a community feel amongst students. It will afford older students the opportunity to be role models and for younger students to aspire. It will also help to teach students that throughout life they will encounter competition and whilst they may not always be successful, we hope that they can learn the skills and resilience to collaborate with those around them for support to enable them to continue to aspire and achieve.

There are Six houses at Glebelands each named after an inspirational figure, who has contributed significantly to their field, suggested and voted for by students. Due to there being five tutor groups currently in year 10 and 11 we are starting the House System with five of the six houses and will introduce the final house in September 2024. Within each house will be a tutor group from each year group. 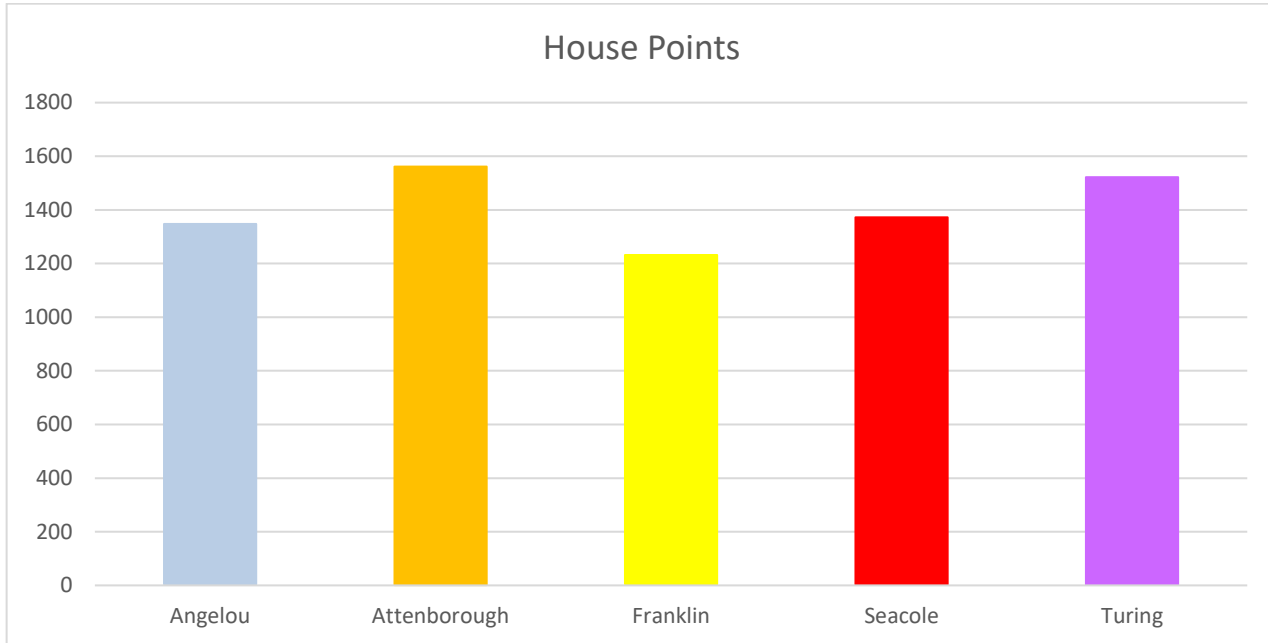

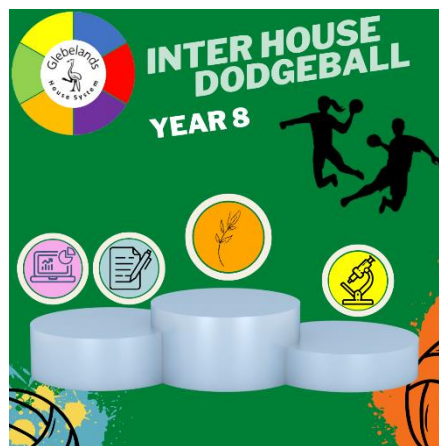
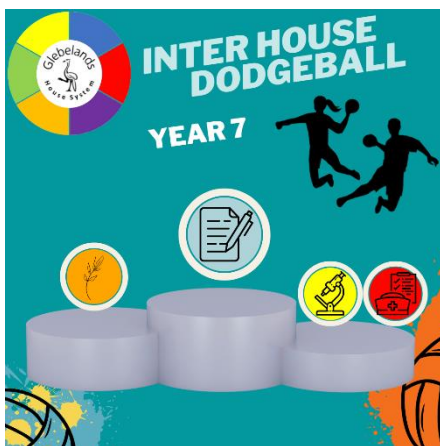
explained the games well and all students had a fantastic morning. We received some very positive feedback from Active Surrey who host the event:

ATTENDANCE MATTERS

We are all aware that attendance is important. All research informs us of this: we know that students are more likely to succeed in academics when they attend school consistently. At Glebelands we do not underestimate the impact that parental support has on ensuring good attendance. With your continued support we can all work to gain back control and make their future years a success.

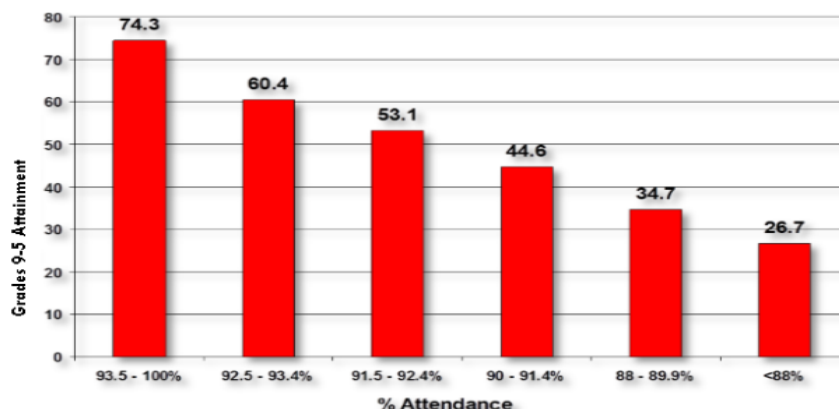


Students who are frequently absent will fall behind with learning, we do not want this to happen; absence can make students feel anxious and vulnerable; we do not want this for our students. All students at Glebelands are valued, important and anything that gets in the way of their education is important to us.

Missing a few days of school here and there may not seem a big deal, but research shows that it can have a significant impact on children's learning. Most of the work they miss is never made up, which can lead to big gaps in their learning.

Fact: Students who are absent between 10 and 12% of school (that's 19 to 24 days per year) stand only between a 45% to 35% chance of achieving five or more good GCSEs, compared to 74% of those who miss fewer than 5% of school days.

Attendance

Our target is **96%**- but we are some way off reaching our target. The Department for Education tracks attendance carefully and judgements on how well a school is doing is partially based on whole school attendance. Whole school attendance up to 2nd December was **93.2%**.

- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on - paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit - if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

If your child is eligible for free school meals, they'll remain eligible until they finish the phase of secondary schooling they're in on 31 March 2023.
