#### YEAR 7

Year 7 have made an excellent start to their life at secondary school. Transitioning to 'big school' always brings new challenges, but Year 7 have done a great job settling in and I've had some lovely positive feedback from many of their teachers. Students are looking very smart in their uniforms and they have an excellent attitude towards their progress and achievement in their lessons; they have impressed me, their tutors and the rest of the staff.

Adjusting to a life full of many books and lots of equipment can present students with new challenges. Please encourage your son/daughter to come to school equipped with their journal, reading book and a fully stocked pencil case. Journals have space to write in notes and many students find it helpful to write in when homework is set and when it is due. Encourage your student to make use of the journal and to regularly check Insight in order to stay on top of homework deadlines.

I have been impressed by how many Year 7s have been making regular use of homework club to allow them to stay on top of the homework that is set each week. This is a mark of their determination to do well at Glebelands and is an excellent start to positive study habits that will see them through their secondary education. Homework club runs every night after school until 4.30pm and can be attended by any student as and when they need to.

Secondary school is a time for making new friends and expanding existing friendship groups, but these things can take time and sometimes there are hiccups along the way. Where friendships have been most put to the test so far has been where social media chat groups have been involved. Can I please ask that you check your student's social media messaging often and discourage students from joining the larger chat groups with people they don't know in person? Thank you for your support in this matter. Fortunately, these friendship issues are rare and we have seen many new friendships blossom over the past few weeks and we are looking forward to seeing some great teamwork in our Enrichment day team building on Friday.

Be that through their participation in the Thrive activities or by attending lunch/after school clubs such as musical theatre, choir, orchestra, science club, table tennis, football, netball, basketball and hockey. These clubs are an excellent way to make friends while learning new skills and representing the school. In fact, we've already had Year 7 teams play in football and netball matches with the girls winning their match against Rodborough. I was also very happy to see such a great turnout to our first interhouse competition of the year, the dodgeball tournament. 7MPR – Franklin house – took the win. We are very much looking forward to our next interhouse competition which will be our enrichment day team building activity.

#### Commendations

Students in Year 7 are working very hard to earn commendation points that are added to Insight once they reach every full card of 25 commendations. There are several students who have reached the 50-commendation threshold now, and Finn Bellamy is our first student to reach over 75 commendations, well done Finn. Many students have completed at least one commendation card. The other good news is that 78 students still have zero concerns so far which shows their commitment to embracing life at Glebelands.



#### **YEAR 10**

It has been lovely to see the enthusiasm that the Y10 students have returned to their studies this year. With the start of their GCSE options, they certainly have been motivated. The level of engagement in lessons is noticeably different, a lot more focus.

We also have a number of students who have started to attend Godalming college. The students studying this course have had to mature quickly as they are travelling to and from college on the bus, socialising with students from other schools and studying a course has future employment opportunities available to them.

During the assembly on Tuesday the 3<sup>rd</sup> October, we invited a representative from the Waverly Federation to talk to the students about their work experience placements and started the process of preparing the students for what is going to happen in the week beginning the 22<sup>nd</sup> April and ending Friday the 26<sup>th</sup>. We encouraged the students to talk at home about possible ideas for a placement and I know from the emails that I have received since that a number of students have already done this. The following Tuesday, 10<sup>th</sup> October Mr Kerry came into the assembly and spoke to the students about a new online revision programme available to help your child study at home called TASSOMAI. I have to point out, this is not aimed at replacing revision but to add to and support your child's revision with a programme that is easily accessible and useable from all devices, including their mobile phones!

Mrs Clark also spoke in the same assembly about Mindset Mentoring, a programme that a number of our current Y10's benefitted from when they were in Y7&8. Again, I would encourage all students to get involved in this and



help guide those students in the younger years become more comfortable in their new school and help them overcome any problems or fears they might have.

As always, I am super impressed with all the extra curriculum activities that all our students are involved in. The below students have recently passed their DofE Bronze award, the Y10 Netball recently came a close second to St Peters in the Waverly Netball tournament. 

# ATTENDANCE MATTERS


We are all aware that attendance is important. All research informs us of this: we know that students are more likely to succeed in academics when they attend school consistently. At Glebelands we do not underestimate the impact that parental support has on ensuring good attendance. With your continued support we can all work to gain back control and make their future years a success.



Students who are frequently absent will fall behind with learning, we do not want this to happen; absence can make students feel anxious and vulnerable; we do not want this for our students. All students at Glebelands are valued, important and anything that gets in the way of their education is important to us.

Missing a few days of school here and there may not seem a big deal, but research shows that it can have a significant impact on children's learning. Most of the work they miss is never made up, which can lead to big gaps in their learning.

Fact: Students who are absent between 10 and 12% of school (that's 19 to 24 days per year) stand only between a 45% to 35% chance of achieving five or more good GCSEs, compared to 74% of those who miss fewer than 5% of school days.



#### Attendance

Our target is **96%**- but we are some way off reaching our target. The Department for Education tracks attendance carefully and judgements on how well a school is doing is partially based on whole school attendance. Whole school attendance up to mid October was **93.2%**.


