A Message from our Headteacher

Dear Parents and Guardians,

As we reach the end of this half-term, I would like to take a moment to reflect on what has been an exceptionally busy and productive few weeks at Glebelands.

We were delighted to welcome so many of you into school for our Year 10 and Year 11 Parents' Evenings. Thank you for taking the time to attend and to engage so positively with staff about your child's progress. These conversations are invaluable in ensuring that students continue to move forward with clarity and confidence as they approach key milestones in their GCSE courses.

Our Year 9 students completed their Test Week this half-term, which was preceded by our parental information evening on The Glebelands Way to Revision. It was encouraging to see so many families attend and engage with the strategies shared. I have been particularly pleased with the mature attitude, focus and effort shown by Year 9 throughout the week itself. Developing strong revision habits early is an important part of our commitment to helping students both Respect and Achieve.

We have also held two INSET days during which staff worked collaboratively with colleagues from across our Trust to further develop our pedagogical practice within subjects. These opportunities to share expertise and reflect on teaching ensure that we continue to refine our craft and provide the highest quality learning experiences for our students.

At the end of January, we welcomed four senior leaders from other secondary schools within the Trust, alongside a trained Ofsted inspector, for a Learning Review. Over the course of the day, they visited lessons, met with staff and spoke to students in order to provide professional feedback on our ongoing work to enhance provision. It was a very positive experience, with much affirmation of the strengths within the school as well as constructive next steps to help us continue to improve. We are grateful for their insight and for the professional dialogue it generated.

Beyond the classroom, students have continued to embrace the wide range of opportunities available to them. This has included participation in a Science competition, progress within the Duke of Edinburgh's Award programme, and a full calendar of sports fixtures. We have celebrated particular success in recent gymnastics and swimming events, and we are proud of the commitment and sportsmanship shown by all who have represented the school.

In addition, there has been an enormous amount of work taking place behind the scenes in preparation for our performance next half-term at G Live. This is the first time Glebelands has been involved in this opportunity, and it has been wonderful to see so many students and staff giving up their time – through rehearsals, technical preparation and organisation – to ensure it is a success. The energy, teamwork and dedication demonstrated have been outstanding, and we very much look forward to sharing the finished performance with you.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank Mrs Imran for the dedication and care she has shown in supporting our students over the past few years. She has made a meaningful contribution to the life of the school and to the young people she has worked with. We are grateful for all she has done and wish her every success and happiness as she moves on to her new school.

Last week we also marked Kindness Week. My thanks go to Miss Retter, Mrs Clarke, School Council leaders and House Captains who co-ordinated the initiative so thoughtfully. The activities and messages shared throughout the week were a timely reminder of the importance of community, empathy and mutual respect – values which sit at the heart of our ethos.

Thank you, as always, for your continued support of the school. I wish you and your families a restful and enjoyable half-term break. Let us hope that the weather is a little kinder to us than it has been over the past few weeks.

Attendance Matters



School Attendance & Penalties for Non-Attendance

In 2024 the National Framework for Penalty Notices was issued by the DfE. There is now a single consistent national threshold for when a penalty notice must be considered by all schools in England of 10 sessions (usually equivalent to 5 school days) of unauthorised absence within a rolling 10 school week period. These sessions do not have to be consecutive and can be made up of a combination of any type of unauthorised absence. The 10-school week period can span different terms or school years. **Please note:** The DfE does not consider a need or desire for a holiday or other absence for the purpose of leisure and recreation to be an exceptional circumstance.

Reporting Absence

When absence is unavoidable, please report in the following ways:

- **First morning of any absence**, indicating the cause and likely duration of the absence please call 01483 542408 by 8.45am. A truancy call will be sent upon any unknown student absence.
- **Medical or dental appointment**, email the school in advance on absence@glebelands.surrey.sch.uk
- **Planned leave** - Absence forms can be obtained on the Attendance page of our website.



Attendance Matters

PENALTY FINES FOR NON- ATTENDANCE

Per Parent*, Per Child

A School Penalty Notice is issued to each parent*, for each child that was absent.

For example: 3 siblings absent for term time leave, would result in each parent receiving 3 separate penalty notices

*Parent

Section 576 of the Education Act 1996 defines "parent" as:

- All natural (biological) parents, whether they are married or not.
- Any person who, although not a natural parent, has parental responsibility for a child or young person.
- Any person who, although not a natural parent, has care of a child or young person.



FIRST OFFENCE

The first time a Penalty Notice is issued for unauthorised absence the amount will be: £160 per parent, per child paid within 28 days. Reduced to £80 per parent, per child if paid within 21 days.



SECOND OFFENCE

(within 3 years)

The Second time a Penalty Notice is issued for unauthorised absence the amount will be: £160 per parent, per child paid within 28 days.



THIRD OFFENCE

(within 3 years)

The third time an offence is committed a Penalty Notice will not be issued and the case could be presented straight to the Magistrate's Court. Prosecution can result in Criminal records and fines of up to £2,500
Cases found guilty in Magistrates' Court may show on the parent's future DBS certificate due to 'failure to safeguard a child's education'.

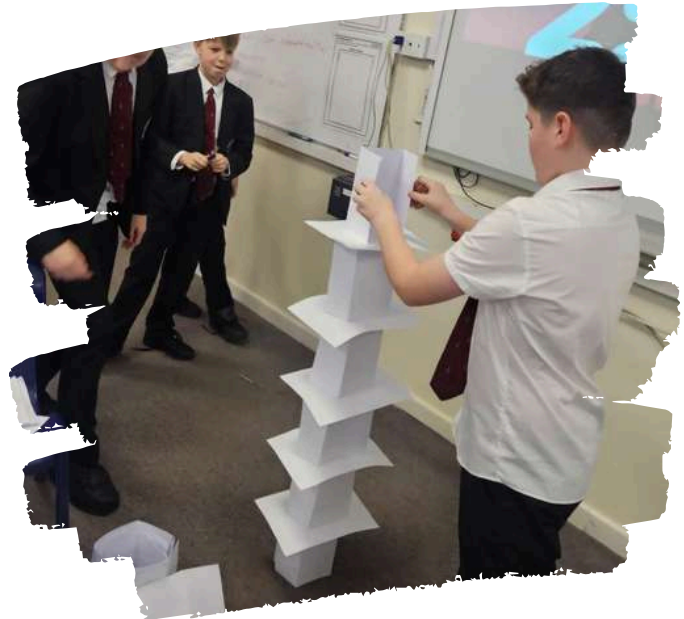

Year 9 Activities

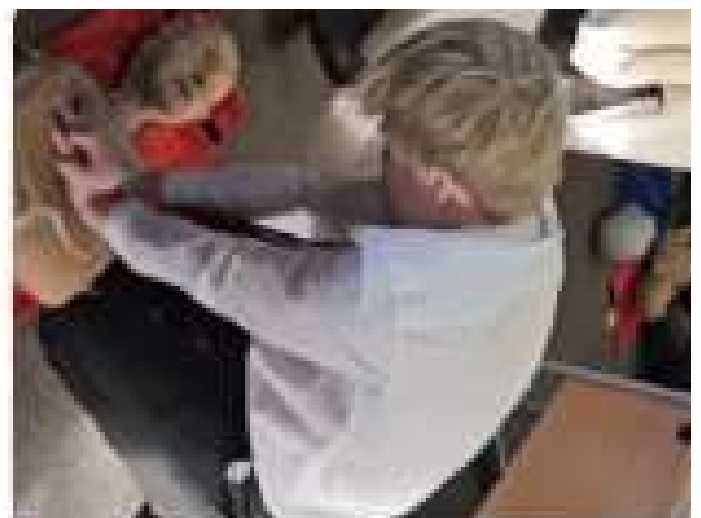
Learning for Life

This term, our Year 9 students took part in an important learning experience: basic first aid with a focus on hands-only CPR. The session equipped students with practical skills and the confidence to act in an emergency situation.

Students learned how to recognise cardiac arrest, how to call for help, and how to perform hands-only CPR by delivering firm, fast chest compressions. Emphasis was placed on staying calm, ensuring personal safety, and understanding that early action can save lives.

Through demonstrations and hands-on practice using CPR mannequins, students were able to apply their learning in a safe and supportive environment. Learning first aid at school helps build responsibility, resilience, and community awareness. These essential life skills not only support student wellbeing but also prepare our young people to look out for others beyond the classroom.

We are proud of the enthusiasm and maturity shown by Year 9 during these lessons.

Year 11 Art Trip to Watts Gallery

On Thursday 29th January, our Year 11 Art students enjoyed an inspiring educational visit to Watts Gallery, Artists' Village in Surrey. The visit provided a valuable opportunity for students to engage directly with the life, work, and creative legacy of George Frederic Watts, and his wife Mary Watts.

Students explored several key areas of the site, including the Watts Chapel, the historic house and studio, and the main gallery. Each space offered unique insight into the artists' beliefs, working practices and the wider Arts and Crafts movement. The intricate decoration of the Chapel, much of which was designed by Mary Watts, proved particularly fascinating and sparked thoughtful discussion about symbolism, craftsmanship and collaboration in art.



A highlight of the day was a hands-on clay tile workshop, where students were able to design and create their own relief tiles inspired by the techniques and decorative motifs they had seen around the site. This practical session encouraged creativity, problem-solving and experimentation, while reinforcing key skills relevant to their GCSE

Throughout the visit, students demonstrated excellent engagement, curiosity and behaviour, asking insightful questions, studiously sketching, and showing enthusiasm for the activities. The experience helped deepen their understanding of art beyond the classroom and illustrated how historical context and environment can influence artistic practice.

The visit was a memorable and enriching experience that will continue to inform and inspire students' work for their GCSE exam projects.

Kindness Quest – spreading joy in our school community



We end the first half of Spring Term on a real high here at Glebelands. Over the last two weeks, our School Council Leadership Team and House Captains have been helping us out with a whole-school personal development initiative, which has been a roaring success!

The project was launched in character development sessions during tutor-time, where students learned about the power of simple acts of kindness. 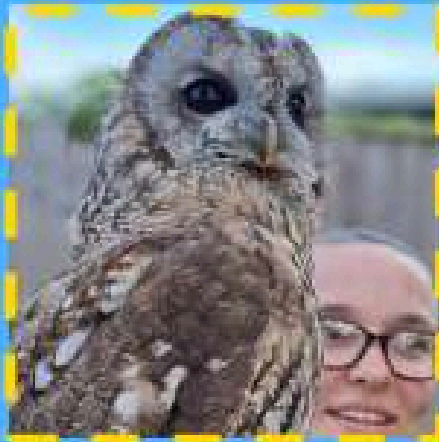

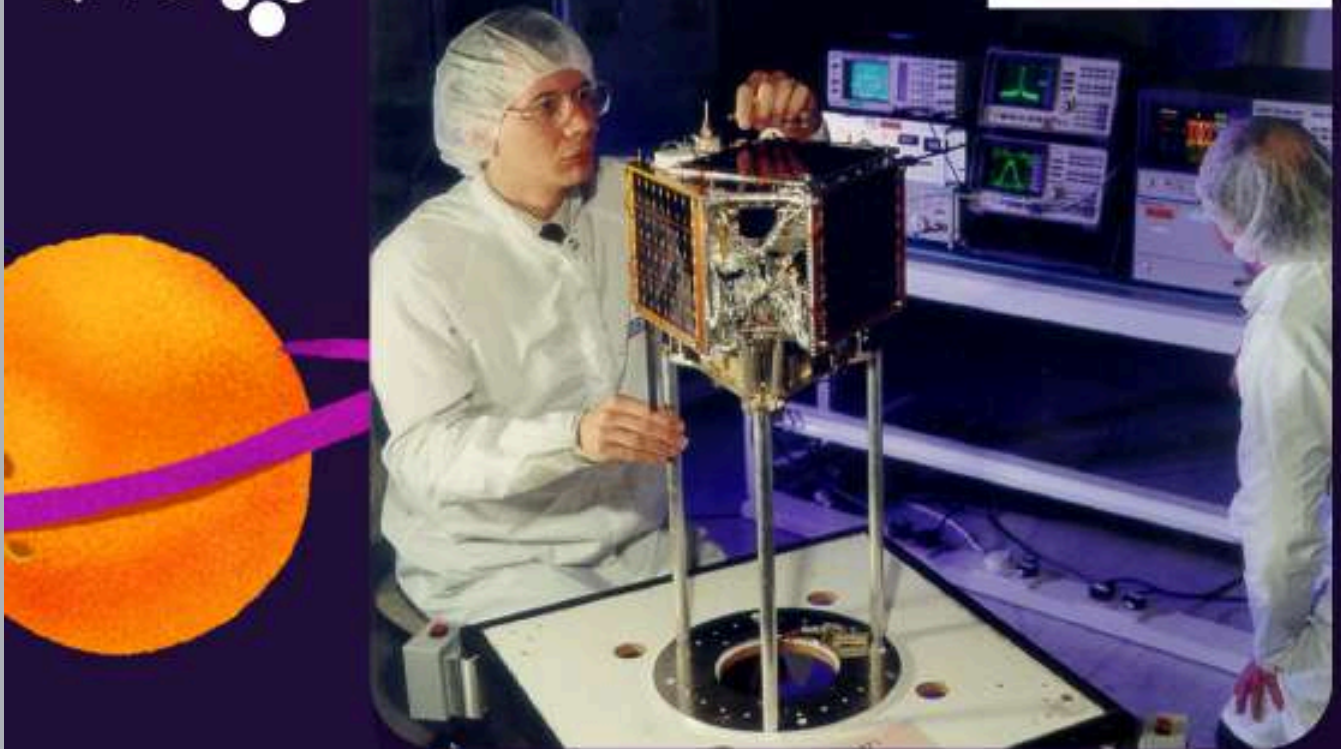
